## MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I welcome staff, students, parents and partners of Girrawheen Senior High School to our 2018 academic year. It has begun to be an exciting, busy and positive year. Staff have already organised several events, activities and excursions linked to curriculum and special days. Our newsletter highlights a number of these, which have already made a positive impact on our students.

### **Year 12 Achievements 2017**

Achievement and Success aptly describes our Year 12 student results over the past years. As a result of the strong support provided by staff, business partners and University, our students have been attaining positive results. Over the past 3 years, Year 12 students from GSHS have been State Award and Exhibition winners. In the 2017 results Jeninna Cruz achieved a subject Certificate in Excellence for English, placing her in the top 0.5%, and our school attainment for 2017 was 97%. Jeninna was highlighted in the West Australian, with a noteworthy story about her. This wonderful story has been included within this newsletter. The Year 12 Class of 2017 achieved positive results in their Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) examinations, as well as their Vocational Education and Training (VET) certificates. Several of our students attained Australian Tertiary Admission Ranking (ATAR) scores between 81.0 - 92.85% and have been accepted into Curtin University and the University of Western Australia, many of whom will be pursuing Science related careers. The School's WACE achievement rate was 75%, meeting our priority target, which is an improvement on our 2016 results. 25% of our students were non OLNAs achievers. Solid results occurred with 100% of our eligible students achieving Attainment. The ATAR results are progressive for our school context.

## *Stem Presentations - Techtrails*

The purpose of Techtrails is to open the minds of the young women and men to the possibility of careers in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). WiTWA brings together women in all sorts of STEM-related industries and roles to speak with students so they can see first-hand that women can and do succeed in such roles.

Our students experienced a broad range of activities examining what ICT could achieve using Modern Technology, Geology in Practice, Physics in the Workforce, Practical Astrophysics using a mobile phone, Careers in IT and Zoology in Action.

The presenters were engaging, enthusiastic and from a broad range of fields in STEM.

### **Want to know about the OLNA?**

OLNA stands for the Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment. In order to demonstrate the required literacy and numeracy standards for the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE), some students are expected to sit this assessment. The School Curriculum and Standards Authority (Authority) awards the WACE at the end of Year 12 to students who have met all the requirements. You can find more about the requirements on the Authority website at [www.scsa.wa.edu.au](http://www.scsa.wa.edu.au).

Some students prequalify for the literacy and numeracy requirement through their performance in the Year 9 NAPLAN test. We will inform you whether your child needs to sit the OLNA, which is held in March and September each year, starting in Year 10. This means students will have up to six opportunities before the end of Year 12 to meet the requirement.

The OLNA has three components—reading, writing and numeracy. The reading and numeracy components comprise 45 multiple-choice questions; the writing component is an extended response of up to 600 words. Students are allowed 50 minutes for the reading and numeracy components and 60 minutes for the writing.

To prepare our students for the types of questions they can expect and to familiarise them with the online assessment platform, we provide access to practice and example tests on a secure website. The link to the secure website for the practice and example tests is available on the Authority website at [www.scsa.wa.edu.au](http://www.scsa.wa.edu.au) under Years 11 and 12 > Assessment > OLNA > Practice and Example Tests.

For students with disability, we have guidelines to help determine the appropriate adjustments for equal access. Information about disability adjustments is available on the Authority website under Years 11 and 12 > Assessment > Disability Adjustment Guidelines

Students who do not demonstrate the literacy and numeracy standard by the time they exit senior secondary schooling can apply to the Authority to re-sit the OLNA at any age.

# Girrawheen high school teen defies odds and language barrier to fulfil dreams

Girrawheen Senior High School student Jeninna Cruz will be among thousands of teenagers nervously waiting for their Year 12 exam results next week. But no matter her score, she has achieved more than anyone would have believed possible a few years ago.

The 18-year-old did not learn to speak English until she was 11, after her family moved to Perth from the Philippines. Now she dreams of studying medicine and becoming a cardiothoracic surgeon. "Coming from a Third World country, seeing how hard life is there, put me in the mindset that I want to be someone that's of help," she said.

Jeninna was selected for a national science youth forum in Canberra earlier this year and then earned a place at an international forum in England. She juggled her Year 12 studies with working up to three shifts a week at a fast food store. "Year 12 is quite expensive and we have family back at home as well and I didn't want to bother my parents with having to ask them for money," she said. "It was a bunch of sleepless nights but I just told myself it would be worth it in the end."

When exam results are released on Tuesday, she hopes to achieve an ATAR high enough to gain entry to science at the University of WA.

Girrawheen Principal Rosalba Butterworth said students from migrant backgrounds often had to work twice as hard to get over the language barrier but they excelled once they got to university.

"I know Jeninna will make the most of every opportunity offered to her," she said.

The day included a range of meaningful cultural, teambuilding, leadership activities, educational activities and art activities for the girls to actively participate in. The day is also about reviewing the "Girls Academy Student Contract" in the Enrolment Package and discussing the expectations of the girls and staff.



We had several local organisations involved in the day such as Bindi Bindi Dreaming doing catering of cultural foods, Karise Delcours a renowned local artist, City of Wanneroo Youth Development Team, Department of Fire and Emergency Services building relationships with the girls and seeing what the Girls Academy is all about for current and future partnerships.

We had four amazing women on our "Strong Women's Panel"; Cassie Davidson from the Freo Dockers, Jordin Godula from Murdoch University Aboriginal Centre Kulbardi, Constable Tatum Gibson from Cannington Police Team, and Marissa Verma from Bindi Bindi. We also had great support from Des Delcours, Narelle Henry and Colleen Devlin on behalf of the Girls Academy. To see the girls transform from the start of the day to the finish was incredible to experience. To see them building relationships, engage with the guests and one another was a true definition of what the day was supposed to represent.



In Week 5, Friday 2<sup>nd</sup> March at Noranda, 16 students from Years 7-10 participated in the Kirby Bentley Cup. Our girls have had the support and guidance of Adam Cockie, Community Engagement Coordinator, WA Football Commission and our GGA football girls represented the Subiaco District. All their hard work and Training paid off and the girls won more games this year than they did last year. To see their enthusiasm and commitment pay-off for all the early morning and afternoon training sessions was rewarding. It was great to see the senior girls have taken the roll of coaching the junior girls very seriously and should be commended for their outstanding leadership.

Week 6, Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> March, was the Roots & Shoots Perth Zoo yearly conference. Samantha Eaton and six girls spent the day at the Zoo learning about all the animals. ### ***MOTIVATIONAL SPEAKER VISITS GIRRAWHEEN SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL***

**On Friday 16<sup>th</sup> of March** we had a guest speaker **Paris Mitchell** visit Girrawheen Senior High School to speak with students of all year levels.

Paris Mitchell is a Perth based motivational speaker who over the last year and a half has spoken to nearly 20,000 students at over 20 high schools in Western Australia, including at Kent Street Senior High School, Nagle Catholic College, Butler College, Christchurch Grammar and an array of others.



Over the course of a day Paris shared his personal experience overcoming mental health problems, depression, serious drug addiction and incarceration issues in a very real, relatable and practical manner. Paris utilised music and video in his presentation and his real life experiences overcoming his issues. Paris explains that there is hope for them if they decide that a positive future is what they really want and if they slowly start making little changes today. Paris clarified the importance of creating a personal life vision, developing healthy habits and reaching out for support if you are struggling. A story of hope, a story of change, a story of inspiration.
